ROCKLAND, Maine - For one weekend in March, the town of Rockland, Maine, treats chocolate as if it were the Holy Grail.

Start your exploring and nibbling Saturday morning at the Second Read Cafe with a cup of rich chocolate coffee. As you make your way down Main Street, stop at the Atlantic Baking Co. for some Mudslide Cook-While munching more chocolate delights, pick out some shiny bling for yourself at Pollack's Jewelry, then get a free chocolate palette makeover at the Harbor Beauty Bar.

Head over to Rockland Chocolates, where a fountain of melted Belgian chocolate will just beg for you to help yourself, the take a

lesson on making decadent chocolate truffles with the chef at the Pastry Garden. Indulge your dog with some of Critter Outfitter's carob chocolate biscuits, and indulge yourself next door at the Puffins Nest, where owner Annie Hoppe bakes up Moose Chunk Cookies. The heady scent of chocolate soap will greet you as you enter the upscale shop Treasures From the Heart.

If your feet are tired from all the shopping, Saturday afternoon will be the perfect time to enjoy a viewing of "Chocolat" at the historic Strand Theater.

You can mix a little art and history into weekend at two of Rockland's museums.

Two miles out of Rockland, on Route 73, is the Owl's Head Transportation Museum, home to an extraordinary collection of antique aircraft, automobiles, motorcycles and bicycles dating from the early 1800s to 1980.

Among vehicles on display are an 1804 Cayley Glider and a 1917 Fokker Dr. I tri-plane, the type flown by Manfred Von March, when the Berry Manor, Richthofen, the Red Baron of World War I fame. Automobile classics include a 1926 Ford late demonstrations and, best of Snowmobile and a 1963 Ford all, chocolate tastings.

Near the museum is Owl's Head Light, built in 1825 and still an active lighthouse. Climb the steps to its base for a gorgeous view over Penobscot Bay.

The Farnsworth Museum has been an icon in Rockland since 1948. The museum's Wyeth Center is devoted to paintings by America's foremost family of artists - N.C., Andrew and James Wyeth.

Current exhibitions are: "James Wyeth: Selected Works," a collection of his paintings and works on paper from the mid-1960s to 2000, and "Maine In America: Approaching Abstraction," which includes early 20th century abstract art by Marguerite Zorach, Rockwell Kent and John Marin.

End the day with a hot chocolate oil body massage and hot stone treatment at the Sanctuary Day Spa. You'll feel like a new person, ready for more chocolate, and the main event, Sunday's Inn to Inn Chocolate Limerock and Captain Lindsey House inns offer tours, choco-
